



#### Occupational Therapy in Japan

#### History and Numbers

Occupational therapy was introduced in Japan during the early 1900's when Japanese psychiatrists attended a study visit in Europe; however it was not until the 1960's when occupational therapy was established as a profession in Japan. In 1963, the first 3-year educational program was established. In 1965, occupational therapy was legally acknowledged as a profession, and the following year 20 Japanese trained occupational therapists passed the first national board examination. These first 20 Japanese trained occupational therapists together with 2 foreign trained therapists established the Japanese Association of Occupational Therapists. In 1972, Japan was recognized as a member of the World Federation of Occupational Therapists, and in 1996 there were 8000 Japanese occupational therapists. Due to rapid growth in the number of education programs, the number of occupational therapists has continued to increase and as of March 2012, there were 64856 occupational therapists, of which 44958 are JAOT members.







Based on JAOT records, about 67% of occupational therapists are women. In terms of age, 47% are in their 20's, 38% are in their 30's, and 14% are older than 40 years. (Data from 2010)

#### Occupational Therapy Education

Occupational therapy is currently being offered at 2 levels of post-secondary education: technical level (3 or 4 year college) and undergraduate level (4 year university). Since 1990 the number of occupational therapy programs have increased exponentially, challenging faculty and clinical supervisors alike to offer sufficient clinical practice of quality.



There are currently 175 schools offering 123 entry-level occupational therapy programs at the college level. There are 65 university programs. Of these schools, 181 schools are recognized as meeting the WFOT minimum education standard. Currently, annual admissions to colleges is approximately 4,654 students, and admission to universities is 2,381 students. There are also currently 38 masters programs, and 21 doctoral programs.




