	initiate contact with occupational therapists from around the world who share common interests
	Content: Photovoice challenges clinicians, researchers, and educators to work in diverse partnerships to
	facilitate the right of all people to participate in meaningful occupation. Critique of traditional research
	approaches has led to the quest for alternative ways to build knowledge and innovatively apply such
	knowledge in local communities. The utilization of Photovoice can establish partnerships with people from
	diverse backgrounds to participate in setting research agendas and shaping questions through a combination
	of visual and storied methods. This workshop will introduce Photovoice using examples from projects about
	aging and migration, including theoretical principles and practical group exercises.
	Description of teaching methods: A mix of teaching methods will be used, for instance participants will have
	the opportunity to try different photovoice activities such as "framing" of visual materials or photo treasure
	hunt. Group work will also be used to discuss examples from work and experiences with community-based
	organizations in Sweden, Japan, and Canada to further understand what facilitates and hinders photovoice
	processes. The workshop will build on the active participation of the group and on developing skill sets that
	can be used in clinical and research practices.
	Contribution to practice: Methods that pay homage to co-construction of occupations and active engagement
	in a process share ideological values with occupational therapy. Although goals of research and therapy are
	different, there are many intersecting values that can be mined for relevance.
