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## "Narrative-in-action" with people with advanced dementia – better understanding the relation of occupation and identity

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**Introduction** The importance of meaningful occupation for people with dementia living in long-term-care (LTC) is well known, but the group of people with advanced dementia has been neglected in research. Exploring their subjective experience of activity and participation is a challenge because verbal communication may be impaired.

**Objectives** There is a need for innovative methods for data collection and analysis that capture the subjective experiences of people with dementia in a transactional way.

**Method** The use of narrative theory combined with an ethnographic approach led to better insight into the perspective of people with moderate and severe dementia in LTC. Using the narrative-in-action approach (Alsaker, Bongaardt, & Josephsson, 2009) in a qualitative flexible design led to four in-depth case studies.

The **results** help to create a better understanding of the perspective of the person with advanced dementia and allow for a more positive view of dementia that is urgently needed.

**Conclusion** The methodological and ontological challenges in research with people with advanced dementia can be tackled. The narrative-in-action approach is very useful in this regard and leads to deeper understanding of the connections between identity, narrative and occupation.
