# Background

- Increased use of in-patient services
  - Numerous users needing care
  - Premature discharge
  - Scarcity of community-based services

Occupational therapy-led day treatment centre

- -2 staff
- -daily therapeutic programme
- -100 clients
- -20-35 per day

To determine whether attendance at an occupational therapy-led community day treatment centre for mental health care users affects the use of in-patient services in the Western Cape

# Study method

- A pretest-posttest quasi-experimental study design
- Pre-existing data
- Total population sampling (N=44)
- Non-parametric tests used for data analysis

Days spent in hospital


For 24 months before and after interventions was compared for the whole group

Number of admissions to hospital






25 participants (56.8%) had less admissions


Number of days spent in hospital
