







Study context

The population is getting older

The balance between the generations is changing

National and international health policy promotes older adults living at home

Home rehabilitation (reablement) is becoming a more common intervention



(Sims-Gould, Tong et al. 2017, WHO 2015)

What matters to you?

Reablement

Norwegian context

Get a visit from my family, look after my garden and live in my own home.



Next of Kin

Important support for older adults receiving rehabilitation at home

Collaboration with next of kin should be included in all health services

Health professionals in reablement were sometimes reluctant to include next of kin

Families can be complex and, in many cases, extensive

4 municipalities


Participants: (n=15) 8 daughters, 1 daughter-in-law and 6 sons


Data Collection


Interviews (50 -120 min)

Analysis

Constructivistic grounded theory inspired by Charmaz (2014) Software program Nvivo 11









Implications for Occupational therapy

Adult children enable older adults to stay as long as possible in their own home

Adult children can benefit when their parents participate in reablement



Conclusion

Trying to maintain family occupations

Be aware that the same occupations can be performed differently and how this can interfere with family relationships


