

The US leads the world in rates of incarceration







Who's Behind Bars?



U.S. Short Term Jail







- 11 million people cycle through jails each year in the U.S.¹
- City of St. Louis has highest incarceration rate in Missouri.²
- 97% of individuals incarcerated will be released



to the community.³

- OT programming in justicebased settings is rare.³
- Occupation-based programming supports healthy roles, habits, routines and activities.

- City of St. Louis Division of Corrections
- 4 cohorts of women
- 8 week sessions
 - Assessment

Collaborative Programming

Collaborative Approach

- Interprofessional partnerships
- Community members, volunteers, experts, etc.
- Social work, family and community medicine, nutrition and dietetics, law, psychology, career services, community health workers, case managers
- Functional community presentations
 - Activities focused on skill building for community living



Collaborative Programming

Participatory Approach

- Create visuals for "direction" of services

- Treat correctional officers with respect

- Work together to meet common goals

Client-Centered Approach

- Storytellers

Informal Interviews



- Strengths, Struggles, and Interests

- Learn from unique, lived experiences




The Pursuit of Occupational Justice
