The study consisted of a descriptive and explorative design in a cross sectional survey.









23 % have heard about dementia (n=364)



Respondents who have heard about dementia tend to have knowledge about dementia.

22 % have knowledge about dementia (n=343)



Respondents with a higher education have greater knowledge about dementia.

Dementia awareness vs. education




Fig. Dementia awareness vs. education. Have you ever heard about dementia?; n=1,363




Fig. Believe in witchcraft as a spiritual power. Do you believe in witchcraft?; n=1,642





Fig. Witchcraft belief in the family (n=1,612)










Circular flow of missing awareness
